## PCSD #1 Standardized Assessment Descriptions

The intent of this document is to provide students, parents, staff members and other stakeholders with a quick summary of the purpose, types of data, and uses in relation to the different assessments taken by students.

Proficiency Assessment for Wyoming Students (PAWS)	Wyoming's State Assessment in Reading, Math, & Science The purpose is to assess how students are performing in relation to State Standards in Reading, Math, and Science. This is the test data to see whether schools and districts are meeting "Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)" targets for State & Federal accountability legislation. Measures of Academic Progress (MAP Tests)	These tests are designed to measure a student's growth over time and to identify a student's instructional level in reading, mathematics, and language usage. They are "adaptive" computer based assessments that adjust question difficulty based on student responses. They can indicate a student's growth whether the student is below, at, or above grade level in terms of performance. These tests are given to students early in the school year (September) and then at the end of the school year (May). Schools are given the choice of whether to test all students, some students, or no students during the Winter test window. In addition, these students' scores can be compared to other students in the District and across the nation.  **K-1 are given the MAP for Primary Grades tests which include audio questions and are designed for this age group. State Assessment of Student Writing (SASW)	This is a Wyoming writing test that is intended to measure a student's skill in responding to an on demand writing prompt. It is a new test that was field tested during the Spring of 2012. Wyoming ACT Test + ACT Writing Test	This is similar to the "Saturday ACT" test with the difference being that it is administered to every junior statewide during April of each year. The ACT test is a college readiness survey and academic assessment. The survey portion is intended to assist students in career planning. The academic portion tests students in the areas of English, Mathematics, Reading, Science, and Writing.  The results are often used by colleges to determine entrance and course eligibility. ACT Test- Optional	The national ACT administration dates that occur on designated Saturdays are similar to the Wyoming ACT Test. It is a student's/parent's choice for the student to take the ACT test during one or more of the designated dates and they are responsible for fees. Students may take the ACT test multiple times if they choose. PLAN Test	The ACT Plan Test is to assist students in school and career planning, as well as to help identify student academic strengths and needs relative to the ACT test. This will be State mandated starting in 2013 for 10 <sup>th</sup> grade students. EXPLORE Test	The EXPLORE Test is to assist student's in planning for both high school courses and beyond high school. In addition to the career interest survey, it also tests a student's academic strengths and needs relative to growth towards the ACT test.	9 <sup>th</sup> Grade	Standardized Test	
Compass Test- Optional	COMPASS is an untimed, computerized test that helps colleges and other schools evaluate your skills and place you into appropriate courses. Student's receive COMPASS test results immediately upon completion of testing.
